Short Statement of the Reasons for the Proposed Designation:

The property is a fine example of mid-nineteenth century domestic design with some well-preserved interior features. The building also has contextual significance because of its role as a local landmark and the value of the green space surrounding it in a closely built residential area. In addition, the house has great historical significance as the home of George Brown, founder and editor of The Globe, a father of Confederation and an influential Canadian Statesman.
