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## Notice of Intention to Pass a By-Law to Designate The Meisel House at 218 Albert Street To be of Cultural Heritage Value and Interest Pursuant to the Provisions of the Ontario Heritage Act (R.S.O. 1990, Chapter 0.18)

**Take Notice** that the Council of The Corporation of the City of Kingston intends to pass a by-law under Section 29 of the *Ontario Heritage Act*, R.S.O. 1990, Chapter 0.18, to designate the following lands to be of cultural heritage value and interest:

218 Albert Street (Part Lots 917 to 918, Plan A12 as in FR422421, City of Kingston, County of Frontenac), known as the Dr. John Meisel House.

The property, being called the Meisel House, includes a good example of a mid-19<sup>th</sup> century Georgian influenced frame house, including its symmetrical front façade with hipped roof and projecting bay window with unusual "eared" surrounds. This two-storey dwelling, built c. 1877, has direct association with former owners Drs. Etherington, Reed and Meisel, all remarkable members of the Queen's University faculty and prominent figures in the community. Dr. John Meisel was made a Companion of the Order of Canada and is considered one of Canada's eminent political scientists. The Meisel House contributes to the heritage character of Albert Street and is one of the first houses constructed on this block.
