Short Statement of the Reasons for the Proposed
Designation.

The William Goodwin House, 4162 Yonge Street, is
recommended for designation for architectural reasons
as a typical tradesman's dwelling, with its narrow
doorcase, small transom, six-over-six sash windows,
and salt-box rear addition. The three-bay facade,
gabled-roof clapboarded form was a common one when it
was built about 1844 by William Goodwin, a carriage
and wagonmaker in York Mills. Its importance is
augmented by its relationship to the later workers'
cottages nearby on John Street.

on the City Clerk within thirty days of December 22nd,
1980.
