## The Hartley House – 221 London Street

An important Peterborough bricklayer, J.J. Hartley, built the property at 221 London Street in the late 1880s. Hartley built many of Peterborough's finest homes during this era and lived in the neighbourhood of 221 London Street for many years. He also built 217 London Street on the adjoining lot, and it was originally connected to this property by a carriage house in the rear. Upon completion, 221 London Street was sold to Reverend G.H. D Davis.

221 London Street is a good example of 1880s Victorian architecture with Italianate details such as the projecting two-storey bay and stylized classical elements. The builder, J.J. Hartley, was responsible for constructing several houses in the Peterborough area during this period. Moreover, the exterior of this house has remained in good condition and little has been done to alter or compromise the integrity of the building.

The house is located on the south side of London Street, just west of George Street, north of the downtown core. Set in one of the City's oldest residential districts, as part of an intact streetscape, the property helps give context to the historic neighbourhood. The house to the east of 221 London Street is a mirror image of this building. As well, there are several other heritage buildings in the vicinity, including those of Trent University's Traill College located directly to the west.
