## BY-LAW NO. 81-273

A BY-LAW TO DESIGNATE PROPERTY AT 252-254 PRINCESS STREET AS BEING OF ARCHITECTURAL AND HISTORICAL VALUE OR INTEREST,
PURSUANT TO THE PROVISIONS OF THE ONTARIO HERITAGE ACT

PASSED: November 2, 1981

WHEREAS Section 29 of The Ontario Heritage Act, R.S.O. 1980, Chapter 337 authorizes the Council of a municipality to enact by-laws to designate real property, including all buildings and structures thereon, to be of architectural or historic value or interest;

AND WHEREAS a notice of intention to designate 252-254

Princess Street was served on the owner on the 8th day of April,

1981 and was published in the Whig-Standard on April 8th, 15th

and 22nd, 1981;

AND WHEREAS no notices of objection to the proposed designation have been served on the Clerk of the City of Kingston;

THEREFORE the Council of The Corporation of the City of Kingston enacts as follows:

- 1. There is designated as being of architectural and historical value or interest the real property known as 252-254 Princess Street, in the City of Kingston, as more particularly described in Schedule "A" attached hereto.
- 2. The City Solicitor is hereby authorized to cause a copy of this by-law and the reasons for designation to be registered against the land described in Schedule "A" hereto in the Registry Office at Kingston, Ontario.
- 3. The City Clerk is hereby authorized to cause a copy of this by-law to be served on the owner of the land described in

Schedule "A" hereto and on The Ontario Heritage Foundation, and to cause notice of the passing of this by-law to be published in the Whig-Standard once for each of three consecutive weeks.

4. This by-law shall come into force and take effect on its passing.

APPROVED AT THE MEETING OF CITY COUNCIL
HELD ON OCTOBER 19, 1981 (Clause 6, Report No. 102).
AS BEING OF ARCHITECTURAL AND HISTORICAL VALUE OR INTEREST

In 1854 James Reid established a "Furniture Factory" in this building, a former tavern. The family business occupied the ground floor; their dwelling, with large windows, was on the second floor. Own and operate their business in this early commercial building. The original building was a fine example of a commercial building of the mid-century.
