#### NOTICE OF DESIGNATING BY-LAW

TAKE NOTICE that the Council of the Corporation of the City of Ottawa enacted By-law Number 344-80 on the 15th day of October, 1980, as amended by By-law Number 361-80, enacted on the 19th day of November, 1980, designating the lands and buildings known municipally as 159 Murray Street as a property of historical value or interest under The Ontario Heritage Act, 1974, Statutes of Ontario, 1974, Chapter 122, as amended.

#### STATEMENT OF REASONS FOR THE DESIGNATION:

Ecole Guigues at 159 Murray Street is recommended for designation as being of historical value. The site of French language Roman Catholic schools back to 1864, this school was the site of effective public opposition during 1915 to Rule 17 of the Province of Ontario, which forbade the instruction of students in French. This action was a landmark in the struggle of French-Canadians to ensure the survival of their language and culture. In its overall exterior appearance the building is a four storey flat roofed brick institutional building with a stone first floor, regular window spacing, and massive front porch. It was on the front steps at the entrance to the school that the most serious confrontation between the officials of the Government of the Province of Ontario and the members of the Ottawa francophone community took place. An original cornice has been removed.

It is noted that the above does not include reference to the design of the building interior.

AND WHEREAS the Council of The Corporation of the City of Ottawa has caused to be served upon the owners of the lands and premises known as 159 Murray Street more particularly described in Schedule "A" hereto, and upon the Ontario Heritage Foundation, notice of intention to so designate the aforesaid real property and has caused such notice of intention to be published in the Ottawa Citizen newspaper having a general circulation in the City of Ottawa, once a week for three consecutive weeks, namely on the 16th, 23rd and 30th of August, 1980

AND WHEREAS the reasons for the designation are set out as Schedule "B" hereto;

AND WHEREAS no notice of objection to the said proposed designation has been served upon the Clerk of the City of Ottawa;

THEREFORE the Council of The Corporation of the City of Ottawa enacts as follows:-

- 1. There is designated as being of historic value or interest the real property, more particularly described in Schedule "A" hereto, known as 159 Murray Street.
- 2. The City Solicitor is hereby authorized to cause a copy of this by-law to be registered against the property described in Schedule "A" hereto in the proper Land Registry Office.

- The City Clerk is hereby authorized to cause a copy 3. of this by-law to be served upon the owner of the property described in Schedule "A", and upon the Ontario Heritage Foundation, and to cause notice of this by-law to be published in a newspaper having a general circulation in the City of Ottawa.
- The Schedules attached hereto and marked Schedule "A" 4. and Schedule "B" form part of this by-law and all notations, references and other information contained therein shall be as much a part of this by-law as if all the matters and information set forth by the said schedules were all fully described herein.

A by-law of The Corporation of the City of Ottawa amending By-law Number 344-80.

WHEREAS the Council of The Corporation of the City of Ottawa enacted By-law Number 344-80 entitled "A by-law of The Corporation of the City of Ottawa to designate 159 Murray Street to be of historic value or interest", on the 15th day of October, 1980;
