

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**BY-LAW 143 OF 1996  
OF THE CITY OF SARNIA**

"A By-law to Designate the building known municipally as the 245 Cromwell Street,  
Sarnia, Ontario as being of Historic or Architectural Value or Interest

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**WHEREAS** Section 29 of the Ontario Heritage Act, R.S.O. 1990, c.0.18, as amended, authorizes the Council of a municipality to enact a By-law to designate real property, including all buildings and structures thereon, to be of historic or architectural value or interest;

**AND WHEREAS** the Municipal Council of The Corporation of the City of Sarnia has caused to be served on the owners of 245 Cromwell Street, Sarnia, Ontario, and upon the Ontario Heritage Foundation, notice of intention to designate the aforesaid 245 Cromwell Street and has caused such notice to be published in a newspaper having general circulation in the municipality once;


**AND WHEREAS** the reasons for designation are set out in Schedule "B" hereto;


**AND WHEREAS** no notice of objection to the proposed designation has been served on the Clerk of the Municipality;

**NOW THEREFORE** the Municipal Council of The Corporation of the City of Sarnia enacts as follows:

1. That the real property more particularly described in Schedule "A" hereto, and known as 245 Cromwell Street, is hereby designated as being of historic or architectural value or interest.
2. The City Solicitor is hereby authorized to cause a copy of this By-law to be registered in the proper Land Registry Office against the lands described in Schedule "A" hereto, which are the lands affected by this By-law.
3. The City Clerk is hereby authorized to cause a copy of this By-law to be served upon the owners of the aforesaid property and on the Ontario Heritage Foundation and to cause notice of this By-law to be published in a newspaper having general circulation in the City of Sarnia.
4. This By-law comes into force and effect upon being finally passed.

## **SCHEDULE "A"**

The lands known as 245 Cromwell Street can be more particularly described as follows:

Part of Lots D and E (east side of Brock Street), Registered Plan 14, City of Sarnia, County of Lambton, described as PART 3. PLAN 25R3331 and PART 1, PLAN 25R5843.

## SCHEDULE "B"

The front facade of the dwelling is a good example of Canadian Vernacular Architecture. The circular verandah at the front of the dwelling is an original example of Victorian detailing. The upper gable displays scallop cedar shingles and the facade is constructed of local yellow clay brick. The mantle piece and the cast brass fireplace within the dwelling are original and worthy of designation.

Research has traced the dwelling to the late 1890's. The dwelling was used as the manse for the Central Baptist Church from 1912 to 1957. It is believed that the home may have been constructed for George Durand a former City Mayor.
