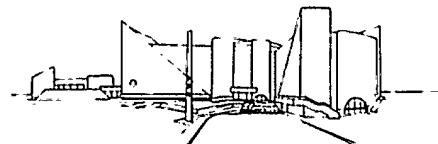



THE CORPORATION OF THE

BY-LAW NUMBER 21030

to designate St. Andrew's Presbyterian  
Church at 115 St. Andrews Road as being  
of historical and architectural value.

---

WHEREAS the Ontario Heritage Act, R.S.O. 1980, Chapter 337, authorizes the Council of a municipality to enact by-laws to designate a real property, including all the buildings and structures thereon, to be of historic or architectural value or interest;

AND WHEREAS the Council of The Corporation of the City of Scarborough has caused to be served upon the owners of the lands and premises known as St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church at 115 St. Andrews Road and upon the Ontario Heritage Foundation notice of intention to so designate the aforesaid real property and has caused such notice of intention to be published in a newspaper having a general circulation in the municipality once for each of three consecutive weeks;

AND WHEREAS the reasons for designation are set out in Schedule "B" hereto;

AND WHEREAS no notice of objection to the said proposed designation has been served upon the Clerk of the municipality;

THEREFORE THE COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION OF THE CITY OF SCARBOROUGH ENACTS AS FOLLOWS;

1. That there is designated as being of architectural value or interest the real property more particularly described in Schedule "A" hereto, known as the St. Andrews Presbyterian Church at 115 St. Andrews Road.
2. That the City Solicitor is hereby authorized to cause a copy of this by-law to be registered against the property described in Schedule "A" hereto in the proper land registry office.

3. That the City Clerk is hereby authorized to cause a copy of this by-law to be served upon the owner of the aforesaid property and upon the Ontario Heritage Foundation and to cause notice of this by-law to be published in a newspaper having general circulation in the City of Scarborough.

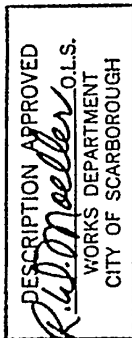
SCHEDULE "A" TO BY-LAW 21030

with the Church of Scotland.

DESCRIPTION OF LAND



In the City of Scarborough in the Municipality of Metropolitan  
Toronto and Being composed of that part of Lot 23 in the  
geographic Township of Scarborough in the County of York  
designated as PART 4 on a reference plan deposited in the Land  
Registry Office for the Registry Division of Toronto Boroughs  
(No.64) as plan 64R-10472.

SCHEDULE "B"

REASONS FOR THE DESIGNATION OF  
"ST. ANDREWS PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH" AT  
115 ST. ANDREWS ROAD

---

This church is recommended for designation for both historical and architectural reasons. This church is the 1849 successor of Scarborough's first church erected on the same location in 1819, and is the oldest brick church in Scarborough. It is a fine example of mid-nineteenth century Gothic revival church architecture with the use of coloured brickwork suggesting the early influences of the Victorian style which became popular later in the century.
