## THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWN OF OAKVILLE BY-LAW 1988-161

A by-law to designate a certain property as a property of historical and architectural value and interest (25 Bronte Road).

THE COUNCIL ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

- The property municipally known as 25 Bronte Road is hereby designated as a property of historical and architectural value and interest pursuant to the Ontario Heritage Act for the reasons set out in Schedule "A" to this by-law.
- The property designated by this by-law is the property described in Schedule "B" attached to this by-law.

## <u>to By-Law 1988-161</u>

REASONS FOR DESIGNATION

The building at 25 Bronte Road is a good example of a recycled building. During the 1850's, a group of black slaves from the United States settled in the Bronte Area. They built small wooden cabins along both sides of Bronte Creek. Many of these cabins were eventually torn down or used in other ways. This particular structure was an outbuilding at Taylor's Sawmill. Duncan McDonald, a widower, moved the cabin from Taylor's Sawmill to its current location where he used it as his residence. When McDonald died, his brother Alex obtained the property which he then sold to Mr. Clemence. Clemence refurbished the building including the replacement of the wooden shingles and the painting of the exterior. It is still used as a residence, and owned by the Clemence family.

The building exhibits a shiplap exterior finish, three bays, wooden eaves and measures 6 metres by 4 metres.

Contextually, the building is an integral part of a block bounded by Jones Street Bronte Road, Ontario Street and Marine Drive which contains several heritage buildings.
