NOTICES OF INTENT TO DESIGNATE

TAKE NOTICE that the Council of the Corporation of the City of Sarnia intends to designate the properties listed below, as being of architectural and/or historical value or interest under Part IV of the Ontario Heritage Act, R.S.O, 1990, c.O.18 as amended.

PROPERTY # 1:

This property is located on the west side of Christina Street South and is known municipally as 115 Christina Street South.

REASONS FOR PROPOSED DESIGNATION

This building is a two and a half storey triple brick home with a large tower projecting from the southeast corner of the façade. The tower is three stories high, ending with a bell-shaped roof. On the third storey of the tower is a band shell verandah. This house is an excellent example of the high Queen Ann Victorian style architecture in the City.

The house, which is historically known as "The Loughead House", was built in the late 1800's by the Doherty Family who operated a stove factory in the City. The family lived in this home for a short time and then sold it to Henry Loughead, a resident of Sarnia, whose family had originated from Scotland. Mr. Loughead was awarded a flag for producing the finest ammunition during both the First and Second World Wars.

PROPERTY #2

This property located on the south-east corner of Vidal and Maria Streets and known municipally as 129 Maria Street

REASONS FOR PROPOSED DESIGNATION

This two-storey stucco and clapboard house, which was originally given the street address of 290 Vidal Street North, is located within one of Sarnia's oldest and most exclusive residential neighbourhoods. The Vidal-Brock Street area is characterized by old stately homes set on large elaborately landscaped lots. This house and its setting are particularly important in establishing the dominant character of the area.

There are three fireplaces, the clapboard on the lower part of the house and the stucco on the upper part, the front verandah, four dormers and most of the windows are all original to the house. The architecture of the first and second floors generally maintained their original characteristics, including high baseboards, mouldings and brass light fixtures.

NOTE:

Any person may, within thirty (30) days of the publication of this Notice, send by mail or deliver to the Clerk of the City of Sarnia, notice of his or her objection to the proposed designations, together with a statement of reason for the objection and relevant facts. If such Notice of Objection is received, the Council of the Corporation of the City of Sarnia shall refer the matter to the Conservation Review Board for hearing.
